Freedom House Honors Community Champions and Raises Funds to Advance Equity in Boston at the 20th Annual Champions of Freedom fundraiser

On Thursday, October 6, 2022, Freedom House hosted its 20th annual Champions of Freedom event at the legendary Scullers Jazz Club in Boston. Back in person for the first time since 2018, the evening featured performances by renowned musician André Ward, awards presentation to extraordinary leaders working to advance economic, social and social justice in Boston; and 150 joyful donors, supporters, and community members.

Champions of Freedom honorees are recognized for their extensive work in progressing economic, social and racial justice; and the substantial impact that work has made towards advancing equity for Black and Brown youth in Boston. Katrina Shaw, former CEO at Freedom House, was presented the Legacy of Freedom award in recognition of her dedication to Freedom House throughout her 10 years of service; and the profound impact that her stewardship had on the staff, students, and families of Freedom House. The evening was abuzz with intergenerational guests from diverse backgrounds and sectors across Boston; all showing support for Freedom House's transformational work advancing equity for Black, Brown, and Immigrant youth in Boston through education and leadership opportunities. Freedom House scholars were prominently celebrated throughout the event. In some of the most powerful moments of the evening, scholars shared remarkable stories of the challenges and achievements on their journey to college. Obstacles of housing insecurity and the difficulties of immigrant integration could not overshadow the remarkable academic and personal triumphs achieved by the scholars. During the event, student scholarship recipients from the 2021-22 school year were also recognized. In celebrating the presentation of these 10 scholarships to Freedom House students, Chief Executive Officer Charmaine Arthur remarked "This evening is for the young people that so many say is our future, but the reality is, they impact our present."
